From Abcde Morales, a Hawaiian language student:



A continuation of our previous Learn a Language Program endeavors, this Virtual Storytime event will feature live readings, fun activities, and new perspectives of language and culture to help students and the community connect with those and the world around them. Students from the Moanalua language classes, WLLC, and Spanish and Japanese clubs have teamed together to volunteer in this feat, and have developed DIY activities and interactive lessons that are sure to make the language and cultural concepts of their focus sessions meaningful and memorable.

"Froggy y su papá" by Jonathan Longon, "Ohana Means Family" by Ilima Loomis, and the story of Momotaro are the three stories to be offered during this event, which will be held over WebEx from 3:00 PM to 4:00 PM on **Thursday, April 1st, 2021**. This Virtual Storytime is truly open to all ages and grades--all and any who may be interested in learning more about the Spanish, Japanese, or Hawaiian languages; who wants to meet new people and make new friends; and who simply wants to enjoy a good, live story reading, which has been a a rarely offered activity throughout this past year. ### This Year's Speech Festival

Now virtual, open to more, and the best that we can make for our students and community

As has become the usual and necessary route for most traditionally large gatherings and events, the 2021 Annual Speech Festival will be held virtually in late April of this year. While students are still prompted to prepare speeches based on certain given prompts and under the critique of rubrics and volunteer judges, the logistics for this year's festival are another first-ever plan in the history of the Moanalua Complex World Language Speech Festival.

Instead of presenting directly to a panel of judges in a classroom, students will now be presenting to a panel of their own peers. Judges will still be present in each virtual room to observe and take note of each presentation, but a new, competitive component has been added to the process of such presentations. At the end of all of the room's speeches, students will be prompted to provide constructive feedback to those that they listened to and observed in their rooms. Such discussions will end with a conclusion of who they believe presented the best speech according to the rubric and the context of their sharing, and the chosen individual will be awarded and recognised for their apparent prowess and outstanding performance in exhibiting their language skills. Regardless of being chosen, however, all students will continue to be observed and critiqued by an adult judge, who will also provide their own comments and feedback on the speeches (as per the typical Speech Festival's purpose). Before and after presentation sessions, students will also be able to join different activity rooms hosted by various school and community organizations to enjoy games, lessons, and virtual fun!

We hope that the new Speech Festival plans will better incentivise investing in language learning and competency, and that it will encourage more collaboration and camaraderie between students in discussing and working towards goals together. This event is also open to students from schools outside of the Moanalua administration and the Moanalua Complex! If you are not a student or teacher from Moanalua High School and are interested in participating or having your students participate in the Speech Festival, please contact Mrs. Jamie Lyn Tateyama to arrange your registration by Wednesday, March 31st. The more the merrier; the more variety of language usage and stories students get to hear, the more they will get to learn about the world and each other, and better they will be able to improve on their own skills!
