
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From Jeremy Ruan, an AP Japanese student:

I remember in the past, there was always a lot of preparation needed leading up to the festival, from writing your speech, to asking for feedback and memorizing your speech. However, the process this year was very different, especially for the AP Japanese students, as we were given a random topic relating to Japanese culture on the spot and had four-minutes to write an outline, then do a two-minute presentation -- which was quite nerve-racking for many of us. Compared to an in-person traditional Speech Festival, I felt like it was not as terrifying as you are in the comfort of your home and just presenting to a computer screen. Regardless, just like any other year, Speech Festival is such an incredible opportunity for one to demonstrate their language skills in a real-world setting and to gain very valuable feedback from professionals in the industry."
